(3) SYLLABUS

The course includes:

- an Introduction to Aristophanes' comedy, with emphasis on the typology of the Old Comedy [Structure, characters, Chorus and types of humor]
- reading and interpretation of selected parts of the play (with special emphasis on satire, language, style, metre and translation),
- analysis of the basic subjects and motifs of the particular comedy, with special emphasis on the parody of the Attic forensic system and rhetoric and on the role reversal between fathers and sons.
- a discussion of matters concerning the staging and the performance.
- a short survey of the staging of the *Frogs* in European and in modern Greek theatre.
