This course aims at familiarizing students with the first theoretical treatment on ancient historiography, Lucian's *How to Write History*. Lucian is known for satire, which he aptly uses in all of his works. In this course we will focus both on his techniques of satire and on his (possible) contribution to the theory of historiography.
