- 5. The use the latest online instruments concerning the study of the ancient texts (databases, online editions etc.).

The student will be able to use the proper bibliography and contuct research within the sepcialized issues of ancient geography.

### (3) SYLLABUS

Strabo is known for his *Geography*, but also wrote *Historical Sketches* (now nearly lost). From his *Geography* only passages from the first and the tenth book and the entire first part of the 17<sup>th</sup> book (about Egypt) will be taught and discussed

1<sup>st</sup> week: General Introduction to the Ancient Geography. The character and the representatives.

2<sup>nd</sup> week: Strabo, transmission and the survival of the texts (papyri and manuscripts).

3<sup>th</sup>-13<sup>th</sup> week: Presentation by the students: Translation and commentary of passages from *Geography*. Commentary regarding the everyday language of the period. Parallel passages from other geographers and historians.
