Thorough study of Greek drama. Familiarization with the epic themes of Greek drama and deeper understanding of the composite nature of the dramatic elaboration of the mythical past (and mainly of the tradition of the Trojan war).

Independent bibliographical research, familiarization with online databases (*TLG*, *APh*, *ThesCRA*, *LIMC*, etc). The seminar requires an oral presentation, participation in class discussions and a written essay.

Students are expected

- (a) To familiarize themselves with ancient Greek dramatic poetry and especially Euripidean poetry.
- (b) To acquaint themselves with electronic and other bibliographical databases, in order

to find and use basic bibliography.

- (c) To argue their positions eloquently and to answer questions effectively in the course of their oral presentation
- (d) To compose a written essay in Greek (or English for Erasmus students)

(2) SYLLABUS

The seminar will focus on Euripides' handling of aspects of the Trojan war story both in iambic and in lyric parts of his dramas.

An introduction to the general subject of study will be provided by the tutor; methodological issues will also be analyzed and topics of papers assigned.

Participants will be expected:

To study thoroughly the particular topic chosen for investigation

To find and study the relevant bibliography

To present their topic orally and answer questions

To write an academic paper on the topic.

More particularly, the seminar will include:

I. Brief introduction to the mythic story of the Trojan War – the Trojan War in epic and lyric poetry (Troy, Trojan War, *Nostoi*)

II. The Trojan War in tragedy

III. Euripides – euripidean tragedy

IV. Survey of tragedies (Trojan themes, characters, episodes)

VI Presentation and discussion of select passages
