- reading and interpretation of selected parts of the play (with special emphasis on satire, language, style, metre and translation),
- -analysis of the basic subjects and motifs of the particular comedy, with special emphasis on comic utopia, the Aristophanic humor and the interpretative approaches that have been proposed.
- Discussion of issues related to direction and performance.
- A brief overview of the play's productions on the European and modern Greek stage.
