- 5) To recognise and analyse the grammar of the Life of Alcibiades
- 6) To describe and critically analyse the Life of Alcibiades
- 7) To use Greek and international bibliography critically and in a way that demonstrates independent thinking
- 8) To build arguments both in written form and orally in response to interpretive questions and in a way that demonstrates synthetical and analytical thinking


