This course will focus on the historiographical work "Chronike Diegesis" by Niketas Choniates (1155-1216). Although we will put emphasis on the aforementioned historian, a discussion will also take place on the historiographical tradition from the 11th up to the 13th century, as regarding the evolution of the genre and the historical framework through major events of the times. Students will get to know in an introductory level the author and his work, the plan of the composition, the narrative techniques and features of the genre, its sources and models of writing, as well as the literary character of the historical work.

- 9. The "absent by then" Constantinople through the narration of the conquest, as well as that of its real and ideal space
