The aim of the seminar is to familiarize students with the study of fragmentary poems (tradtition, techniques of approach), to the literature in the Hellenistic period and its reception in later poetry.

3. COURSE DESCRIPTION

The seminar will focus on the *Aetia* and the *Hecale* of Callimachus. The former is an erudite, fragmentary elegiac poem in four books, which recounts sundry stories accounting for religious practices or local traditions. The latter is written is hexameters and focuses on Attic mythology. The praxis of the seminar will consist in reading through the text ('vertical' approach in which all participate). Written essays by the students will be of a synthetic nature ('horizontal' approach).
