The course aims to an in depth analysis on specific linguistic phenomena that have been raised in the literature of child language acquisition in the last decades. The main focus is the examination of the typological differences in the various stages of language acquisition. The central topics under examination are:

a) Acquisition of word order

- b) Subject-Verb agreement
- c) Subject drop/omission
- d) Object drop/omission
- e) Acquisition of Binding theory
