Learning outcomes

More specifically, the course aims to demonstrate the affinity created by the sharing of these musical paths between the music of different, quite distant regions, which at a closer glance prove to possess a multitude of social characteristics

• Knows the basics of the history of traditional music, not only in Greece but also of the Eastern Mediterranean, Central and Western Asia.
