The students will be introduced to a cultural approach of the history of the Modern Greek Book (15th-19th centuries). Students will be acquainted with the history of the Modern Greek manuscript and printed book (methods of production, dissemination and consuming of the texts) from early modernity towards modernity. The materiality of the book, as a historical and cultural factor, will be co-examined with the texts as such.

The fields of the history of the book, the sociology of the books and that of textual criticism are in the pinnacle of the textual and philological studies worldwide. Through this course, the students will be introduced to cognitive and historical methods that will enrich their scientific background and help them understand their field in depth.
