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<p>The general objective of the course is to make students able to describe the literary conventions in the stream of ethnography and naturalism, and in particular the relationship of literature and Reality. Specifically, upon completion of the course the student will be able to:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> - Describe the basic characteristics of prose of the 1880's - Distinguish the points where the 1880's generation differs from the previous literary tradition - Combine literary texts and correlate them (reviews, essays) with literary history and ideological context of their time - Develop research questions in relation to the varying trends of the generation of the 1880's and their role in the emergence of new literary forms (narrative techniques, short story, etc.)
